This Month in Maritime History: December 20, 1987

Sinking of the ferry *Doña Paz*



On December 20, 1987, the *Doña Paz*, a Philippine-registered passenger ferry, was traveling from Tacloban City, Leyte to Manila. The visibility was reportedly clear, but the seas were choppy. While most of the passengers slept, the ferry collided with the tankship Vector. Both vessels sank within hours. The Vector was carrying 8,800 barrels of gasoline. The impact caused a fire which quickly spread to the *Doña Paz*, as well as lighting the surrounding water on fire. The life jackets aboard the *Doña Paz* were reportedly locked up, forcing passengers to jump into flaming, shark-infested waters. An estimated 4,375 people died from this accident, making it the deadliest peace time disaster in maritime history. According to the initial investigation conducted by the Philippine Coast Guard, only one apprentice member of the crew of the *Doña Paz* was monitoring the bridge when the accident occurred. Other officers were either drinking beer or watching television, while the ship's captain was watching a movie on his VCR. Subsequent inquiries revealed that the Vector was operating without a license, lookout or properly qualified master.
